Here's a Health Unto His Majesty. A Royalist song of the early 17th century. The words are anonymous.

Golden Slumbers. An old Iullaby or craddle-song from the 17th century. The words are anonymous.

Annie Laurie. A Lowland Scots love song written by Lady John Scott who got the words from a Mr. Douglas of Fingland.

My Bonnie. Probably an 18th century song from the north of England. The words are anonymous.

**Drink to me Only.** The poem is by Ben Jonson (1573-1637). The tune is of a later date.

Home, Sweet Home. This song is by Sir Henry Bishop (1788-1855) from his opera *Clari, the Maid of Milan* with libretto by John Howard Payne (1791-1852).

Clementine. A students' song by Percy Montrose.

**Auld lang Syne** 

The Lincolnshire Poacher. Probably an 18th century song. The words are anonymous.

O my love is like a red, a red Rose. An old Scottish song, the words of which were re-written by Robert Burns (1759-1796).

The Vicar of Bray. An amusing late 18th century traditional song which reflects the dilemnas certain people went through during some of the upheavals of English history when there were confusing changes in religion and in politics.

Sally in our Alley. A beautiful old tune to which Henry Carey (1687-1743) adapted words.

The last Rose of Summer. An old Irish tune to which Thomas Moore (1779-1852) fitted words.

Auld Lang Syne. This is the most famous of Robert Burns' reconstructed songs, adapted to a very old Scottish tune in 1794.

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
