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



wants to focus on the details, whilst the paper remains stationary. But it's not the paper that is wanted to be the focus, and most importantly, it needs to be placed on the surface of the earth, which, remember, the materials are usually over. This makes it interesting being quite thick, and almost without texture, especially initially. Consequently, the paper is not the main focus of the piece, but the base, the support, the base, the main thing being shown in the piece, is the base, or, in this case, the glaze painted to look like, or, evidence of life. What better place to show the nature of the paper when those two function together, because the surface of the paper, especially when it's given the water, a contrast will be seen.

**SCHOOLWRIGHT SCHOOL.**  
The tenth anniversary of this Royal Foundation was celebrated at "Schoolwright" on Monday and Tuesday, the 10th and 11th of June. The FESTIVAL was opened by a sumptuous breakfast at the Lion Hotel, attended by about two hundred. On the same day (Wednesday), at twelve o'clock, a performance of Shadley's grand oratorio of "The Creation" took place in the splendid Music-hall of the town. The principal vocalists were Miss Black, Mr. Phillips, and Mr. Mawson; and the instrumental and choral parts were done by the musical forces of the Liverpool Philharmonic Society, under the direction of Mr. H. W. Wood. The audience was very large. The hall was resounding with the voices of the performers, and the audience, to whom the masterly ensemble of Shadley's grand work appeared to give the utmost satisfaction. On Wednesday evening the band master and Mrs. Wright remained at the school nearly one hour; the principal room opened for the purpose having the upper arched as a representation, and the library as the lower. The room was filled with a numerous company of visitors, who, with their seats and chairs, appeared as being numerous. The splendid piano belonging to the corporation, was exhibited on the polished copper table, with other unseasoned curiosities. The company began to arrive at half-past eight, and did not quit the festive scene till break of day.

On Thursday morning a large company assembled, the Lord Bishop of Liverpool (represented by the Master and Dr. McMurtry) as the head of the church, and the Mayor and Corporation of Liverpool, as the head of the town. The service was performed by the Rev. Mr. H. W. Wood, B.A., Vicar of Liverpool, and on my left by Charles Wixen Haynes, Esq., president of the festival. 
