

### ALAN WHEATLEY

*Alan Wheatley is a star of stage, screen and radio. He has been a member of the Old Vic Company, and played in productions of almost all Shakespeare's plays. His favourite roles are Hamlet and Richard II.*

*Shortly after the war, he played at the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées in "This Way to the Tomb" and he has also appeared in the French cinema. He has just made his hundredth appearance on BBC Television.*

### V. C. CLINTON-BADDELEY

*V. C. Clinton-Baddeley, a scholar at Jesus College, Cambridge, was a teacher of history at that University and the Editor of the Modern History section of the Encyclopaedia Britannica, before giving up an academic career to become an actor, broadcaster and author. He has been a BBC performer since 1928, and is best known as a reader of poetry and of the novels of Charles Dickens.*

*He is the author of several pantomimes, operettas and plays, and books on the English Theatre, "Words for Music", "The Burlesque Tradition in the English Theatre after 1660", and "All Right on the Night", a study of behaviour in the 18th century theatre.*

### Miss JILL BALCON

*Miss Jill Balcon is an ex-member of the Old Vic Company and well-known for her readings and recordings of dramatic verse. Miss Balcon is the daughter of Michael Balcon, one of the best-known British film producers, and the wife of the poet, C. Day Lewis.*
